Olney, and Recording Secretary Toni Potes
Absent: Trustees Jason Bradford and Bill Goodfellow

Call to Order / Pledge of Allegiance: Supervisor Bergman called the meeting to order at
7:00 PM, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Additions or Corrections to Agenda: Motion by B. Johnson, second by A. Johnson, to approve
the Agenda as written. Motion carried unanimously.

Public Comment for Agenda Items: Sparta Chief of Police Andrew Milanowski inquired if the
Board would consider allocating funds to the Sparta Police Department for the acquisition of
an A.E.D. for their third truck/car. The approximate costs are \$2800 for the A.E.D., \$400 for a
case, and other medical supplies for a total of \$3200 to \$3500.

Sparta Fire Department Chief Olney piggybacked on Chief Milanowski's statements. He
supports the request.

2. Lease Agreement with Sparta Historical Friends: After review of the agreement by B.
Johnson, motion by B. Johnson, second by A. Johnson, to approve signing the agreement.
Motion carried unanimously.
3. Social Media Policy: Motion by Savage, second by A. Johnson, to deny approval of the
proposed policy. Motion carried unanimously.

4. Planning Commission Recommendation — 9440 Sparta Ave. C-1 to C-2: After review of the request and recommendation of the Sparta Township Planning Commission by B. Johnson, motion by Steffens, second by B. Johnson, to accept the Planning Commission recommendation to rezone the property. Roll call vote: Savage, yea; A. Johnson, yea; B. Johnson, yea; Steffens, yea; Bergman, yea. Motion carried 5 to 0.
5. Public Safety Revenue Sharing — Ashley: After review of the report by A. Johnson, motion by B. Johnson, second by A. Johnson, to table the matter until next month so that the Board may think about and investigate the options available. Motion carried unanimously.

Other Informational: Savage provided a copy of an article to go in the paper, seeking approval before publication. Motion by A. Johnson, second by B. Johnson, to add Steffen's suggested language in the first paragraph clarifying this includes all Village properties, then publish. Motion carried unanimously.

B. Johnson is working again in the cemeteries. There is more participation.

Supervisor Bergman provided information regarding low-flying helicopters checking electrical equipment and ground water conditions.

Steffens provided a County Drain work update. The sports park pond dredging and repairs are about done. Then the parking lot will be addressed.

Public Comment: Sparta Library Director Tuinstra reported the event at the library last night was on TV; Miranda was there. The Library was packed with kids and adults. This Saturday hosts a free event from 10 AM to noon for kids. The summer reading program will have more participants than last year. She met with the Sparta DPW regarding removing stones about five feet back as well as two feet by handicap parking spots, which will be evened out. She answered other questions of the Board.

Adjournment: Motion by B. Johnson, second by Savage, to adjourn at 7:50 PM. Motion carried unanimously. The next regular meeting of the Sparta Board will be Thursday, July 9, 2026, at 7 PM.

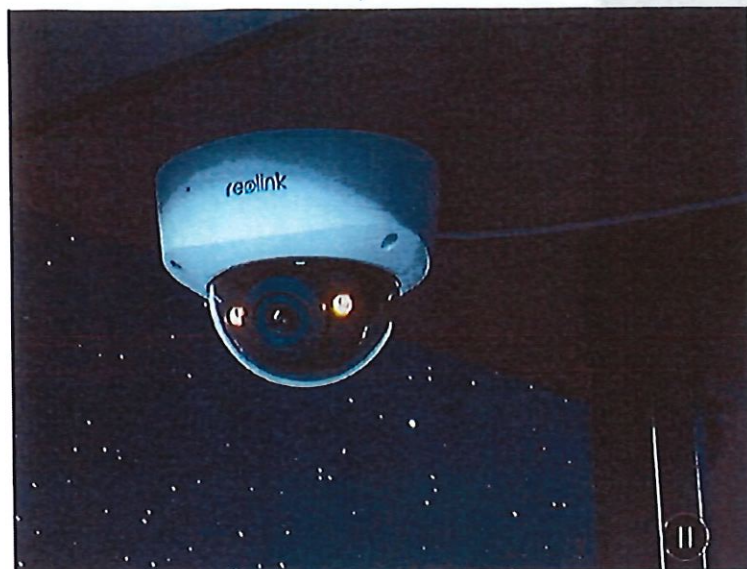
I walked around the outside of your offices yesterday to get a feel for possible camera placement.

Based on what I've experienced with other placements I would have you consider four possible cameras.

On the front walkway please consider having a camera at both ends of the walkway. That way both the activity at the steps and the ramp are both covered, including the outside sidewalk.

The cameras would obviously overlap but each would cover the entryway that the other could not.

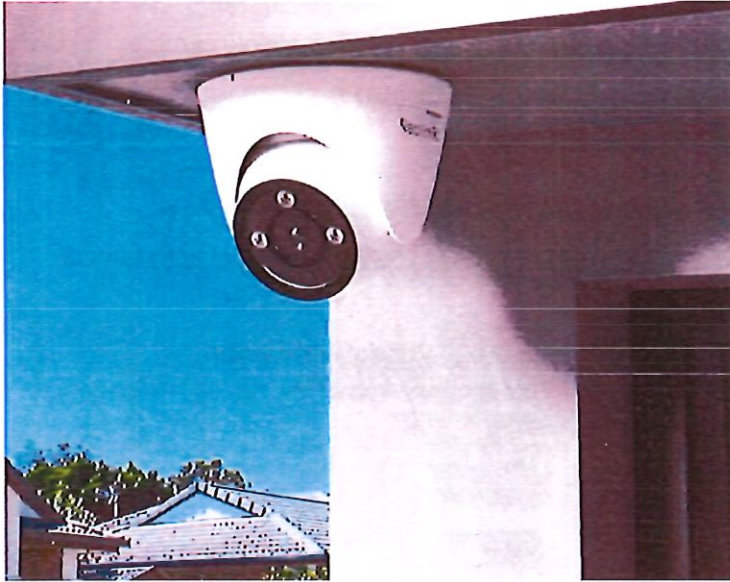

There are a couple of options for the inside camera.

The first is a Security IP Camera, which includes color night vision and motion detection. It is not recording until motion triggers it. At night LED lights come on and it records in 4K color. [\[Official\] Reolink RLC-833A | 4K PoE Camera with Spotlight](#)

The second option also is motion triggered for recording. At night it uses IR LEDs to record so it basically is in black and white, with less detail than the first option. [\[Official\] Reolink RLC-820A | 4K PoE Camera with Smart Detection](#)

For the back door we also have several options.

First is a single lens mounted above the door and pointing down to the sidewalk. This will have limited vision but should cover the entryway with clarity both during the day and at night. [Reolink RLC-810A | 4K PoE IP Camera with Smart Detection](#)

This first camera could also be mounted down the side of the building, facing the backdoor. That would allow more of the sidewalk to be viewed.

Another option if we were to mount the camera down the side of the building facing the doorway is this camera. [\[Official\] Reolink RLC-1212A | 12MP PoE Spotlight Camera](#) It would provide more clarity with a better lens than the above

Next is a dual lens mounted above the door. This would provide a panorama of recording both the doorway and down the sidewalk. The higher we can mount it the more of the street and sidewalk would be viewable. [Reolink Duo 2 PoE | 4K Dual-Lens 180 Degree Camera](#)

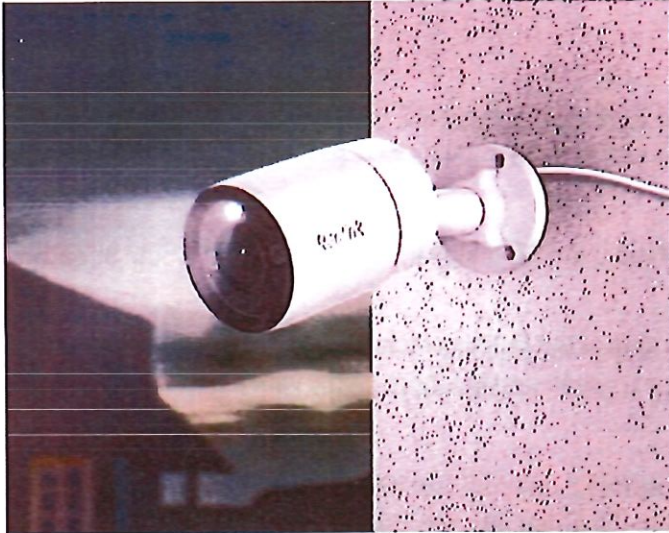

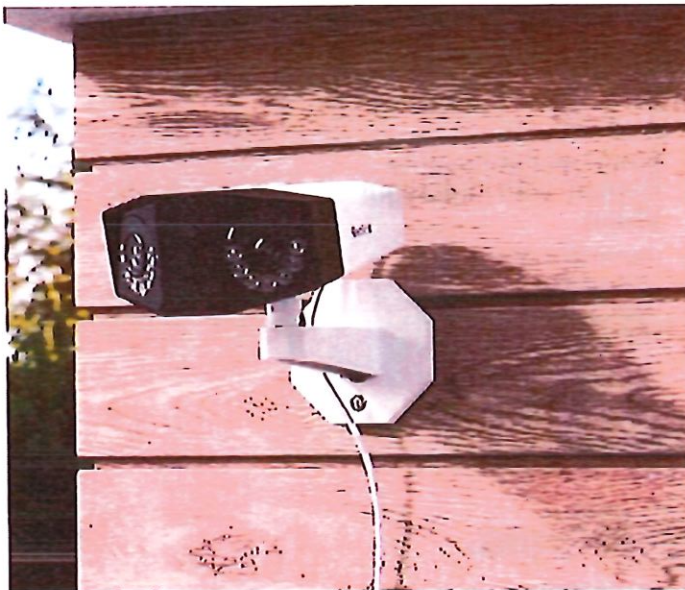

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

Regarding Public Safety Revenue Sharing Funds | Between [Township Name] and Kent County / Kent County Sheriff's Office

Purpose. This MOU is entered into by and between [Township Name] ("Township") and Kent County, on behalf of the Kent County Sheriff's Office ("County/KCSO"), for the purpose of supporting public-safety and law-enforcement services provided to, or benefiting, the Township.

State Funding. The Township receives Public Safety Revenue Sharing funds from the State of Michigan. The parties understand that at least seventy-five percent (75%) of the Township's distribution must be used to fund a law-enforcement agency or law-enforcement officers, either directly or indirectly through a subgrant to another governmental entity.

Use of Funds. Because KCSO provides law-enforcement services that benefit the Township, the Township intends to provide the law-enforcement portion of its Public Safety Revenue Sharing funds to County/KCSO for eligible public-safety and law-enforcement purposes. Eligible uses may include operational, technology, equipment, training, or related costs that support law-enforcement services, including, where appropriate, Real Time Intelligence Center camera-feed costs or similar public-safety technology expenses.

Township Benefits. To the extent reasonably practicable, funds provided by the Township will be used in a manner intended to benefit public-safety and law-enforcement services within, or directly serving, the Township.

Restrictions. County/KCSO agrees that funds received under this MOU will be used only for eligible public-safety and law-enforcement purposes and will not be used for any prohibited purpose under applicable State guidance, including facial recognition technology, person or OPED payments, debt service, lawsuit or claims payments, chemical weapons, or prohibited tactical vehicle expenses.

Annual Cooperation. The parties intend for this cooperative approach to continue on an annual basis for any future Public Safety Revenue Sharing payments received by the Township, subject to State appropriation, receipt of funds by the Township, applicable legal requirements, and the continued mutual agreement of the parties.

Mutual Understanding. This MOU reflects the parties' shared understanding and cooperative intent. It may be modified, supplemented, or discontinued by mutual agreement of the parties as circumstances, funding requirements, or operational needs may warrant.
